

She now works as an analyst for federal freshwater policy.















#### FEATURED FAUNA - The Turtles of Tamagor

On the territory of the Tamagor Association we have a chance to live with two species of turtles. There seems to be no better time to talk about these reptiles since we have entered the nesting season and the females cam be observed moving from their nests to the water. Eggs laid from May to June will hatch in late summer. All turtles in Canada are protected under the Species at Risk Act

#### The Snapping Turtle

The Snapping Turtle is Canada's largest turtle. They can live up to 70 years! Since these turtles don't reach sexual maturity until the age of 15-20, adult mortality has a significant impact one the survival of the species. We love the Snapping Turtle because its way of feeding helps keep our waters clean!

#### Did vou know?

Its reputation for biting is because the Snapping Turtle is unable to fully retract into its shell to protect itself. As with all wild animals, it's important to not approach them as they may react aggressively.

#### The Painted Turtle

The Painted Turtle has a dark shell with red lines on the periphery and yellow lines one the head and neck. The Painted Turtle can live up to 35 years old. They like to bask in the sun, but need dense vegetation to stay hidden from predators. Members often see them laying their eggs on our beaches at Lac Noir and Mud Bay. So please, watch where you step!

#### THREATS TO THIS SPECIES!

#### Destruction of Wetlands

Turtles depend on the conservation of ponds, marshes, lakes, and the dense vegetation that surrounds them to survive. Urban and residential development, and drainage of wetlands is a significant threat to their survival.

#### Road Accidents

During the Spring and Summer, a large number of turtles cross the roads in search of a mating partner, food, and nesting sites. They sometimes use the sand and gravel areas along roadsides to make their nests. This is obviously a dangerous time for them as they are too slow to move out of the way of vehicles. Please drive cautiously

#### Egg Predation

Raccoons, skunks, herons, and snakes are among the many predators of turtle eggs. Visit the Canadian Wildlife Federation website to see how to construct a cage for their protection.

#### HOW TO HELP A TURTLE CROSS THE ROAD?

- I.Reduce your speed on the roads and be aware.
- 2. Before stopping, always make sure of your own safety first. Signal its presence to other motorists and observe it from a distance while waiting for it to cross the road.
- 3. In case of imminent danger only, help the turtle by moving her in the direction she is going, lifting by the shell. If the shell is too heavy, lift the back of the shell and the turtle will walk on its front legs.

NEVER pull a turtle by the tail!

You can also report turtles that cross your path to the <u>Carapace Project</u> to help conserve them.

At last year's inaugural swim on Lac Noir, we were lucky enough to be entertained by an exuberant pair of mating snapping turtles!
